## **Speaker**

## **Brandon Shuler**

Captain Brandon D. Shuler is a seventh-generation Texan and a third-generation fishing guide. He has guided the Lower Laguna Madre in South Texas from his family's lodge, Getaway Adventures Lodge, for the past 10 years. He earned his PhD in Literature from Texas Tech University where he focused on the American Experience in the Outdoors, specifically the Sportsmen's Experience. A book historian by trade, Shuler looks for lost or seldom published outdoors texts that highlight America's outdoor heritage and culture. From his archival work, he discovered the lost manuscript of Hart Stilwell's *Glory of the Silver King: The Golden Age of Tarpon Fishing*. Shuler's other writing can be found in *Outdoor Life*, *Saltwater Sportsman*, *Sportsfishing Magazine*, and he is field editor for *Fly & Light Tackle Angler*.

Shuler recently moved to St. Petersburg's Historical Roser Park Neighborhood with his wife, three kids, two fish tanks, two labs, and a wily cat. He is an Outreach Specialist with the Ocean Conservancy, where he works with anglers to find ways to get them better access to the water and fish while protecting the resource. He was the 2007 Federation of Fly Fishers Conservationist of the Year, and he served on the Federation's National Conservation Board for three years before heading off to earn his PhD.

### **BIG FISH, SMALL BOAT**

Editor's Note: Got this from Suncoast member Walt Ruda:

Well, I got lucky and am blessed to catch such a beautiful fish on a gorgeous morning. We were seeing fish roll here and there so I let myself drift as I blind casted to get more comfortable. Then about a 150 feet from me, 3-4 poons roll and are heading straight for me. I am thinking if they stay on course, I might have a chance. Still casting, they surface again about 75 feet out and still on course. I have a cast out



there and retrieving when I think – do I pull in and cast again or hope I am in the zone. I

chose to be patient and leave the cast out there and strip slower. I had about half the line stripped in and my fly was probably about 10-12 feet down with my sinking tip. Then it happened – STRIP, STRIP, STRIP – BAM!!! GAME ON. ...

## **High-Stick Nymphing**

Many new fly-fishing enthusiasts have had their first success trout fishing with a floating strike indicator and a weighted nymph or 2 on the end of their tippet. If in a drift boat, they can lower the "rig" into the water and watch the "bobber" for some hesitation indicating a take. The guide will maneuver the boat allowing the offering to be in the most fishy locations and often will call out, "Lift or strike," and the sport will raise the rod tip and yell, "Fish on!" True, this is a very effective form of fly fishing not even requiring a cast for success. If wading, a cast is made upstream with a very short line. This is more of a lob to position the rig so that the offerings drift without drag close to the bottom. After the "cast" the rod is held almost vertically keeping the fly line off the water to assist in eliminating drag, following the indicator downstream, referred to as, "high sticking." If this has been your introduction to fly fishing, it will not prepare you for 98 percent of what fly fishing is all about. Time for lessons!

## More Tips:

## EP Baitfish Blues

The EP Baitfish is a great pattern, but it's tough as hell to tie well. You can tie to a certain level of mediocrity, but that only goes so far because the fly won't float properly if the proportions are off or you don't trim it right.

It took me a few tries — actually about a dozen — to truly get locked in on how to use EP. A couple thoughts:

It's important to know how to tie in the EP. Most videos show a stacking method, which is one strand on top of another. This works fine, but a better approach is to angle the EP in a V shape, so that you can either pull the material straight back to create a wider profile or straight down to create a thinner, bladed look. I go for the bladed look toward the back and front and a wider profile in the middle.

Once you tie in everything correctly, it's time to trim and that's not easy. In fact, it took me a while to become confident with the shaping. Pinfish tend to be circular and wider; mullet and assorted whitebait are longer, more streamlined.

At first, I cut at an angle too aggressively too early. The best thing to do is to leave your fly longer, as a rectangle if you will and then round the corners at the end. If you want a shorter stouter fly, go for a squarish shape before trimming the corners. BUT don't trim too sharp too early. Go for the longer, slender look like this:

## Fly of the Month

## **Tarantula Tarpon Bunny**

As tied by Capt. Bryon Chamberlin

What you need/materials Hook: Gamakatsu SL12s 1/0 Thread: Tan flat waxed nylon

**Tail:** 1/4" rabbit zonker

**Body:** Medium hackle feather **Head:** 1/2" EP tarantula brush **Foul guard:** 16-pound mason

**Instructions** 

- 1) Attach thread near bend of the hook and tie in about 2 inches of 16-pound mason facing rear.
- 2) Tie in zonker strip leather side down on top of the mason. Trim the zonker to about 2 inches
- 3) Using either the hook point or bodkin, punch a hole through the leather of the zonker about 1/3 of its length, thread the mason through the hole, bend the mason forward forming a loop and tie down on top of the zonker. Trim excess mason line.
- 4) Tie in a hackle feather by its base and palmer forward. Tie down and trim excess.
- 5) Tie on tarantula brush and palmer toward the hook eye. Secure with thread and trim excess with side cutter or fingernail clippers. Form a head with the tread, whip finish and apply head cement.

## Rise and Shine for Snook

What's Hot: If you are an early riser and love to fly fish, this time of year is perfect for you. Pods of snook are within a few feet of the sand in the trough along most beaches. Although the season is closed, catch-and-release opportunities have never been

better. A large female with a group of smaller males will do their courting in these locations, especially if there is good current flow. Locations with some structure are the best.

**Technique:** A good pair of Polaroid glasses will reveal very large fish. Stay on the bank and out of the water. The rising sun behind you will reveal fish. You will see some baitfish present. Duplicate their size with white flies. Crimp all hooks, making easy penetration possible with a quick release as the fish is still in the water. Hold your cast until the fish is facing you. Then cast to the fishes' side. The fly, with a 30-pound shock tippet, is then retrieved, duplicating an escaping baitfish. It should trigger a violent strike.

Members' catches: Jeff Janecek tore up the bass at the last TBFFC outing. Rick and Logan Valeri had a good day of tarpon fishing in Boca Grande. The Boca Grande trip was preceded by a trip to Fort DeSoto where stamina and fitness were tested to the brink on a sweltering summer evening ... The snook are on the beaches. The key is the wind direction. West winds are not welcome; east winds are your friend. Unfortunately, we've had a run of west winds
