

PLAY HOOKY FOR THE HOLIDAYS

When: December 5, 2008, 8 am - 2 pm

Where: Cockroach Bay Aquatic Preserve - Ruskin, FL

Over the past century, much of the land adjacent to the Cockroach Bay Aquatic Preserve was either farmed or quarried for shell. In recent years, the Southwest Florida Water Management District has led a variety of agencies, organizations and individuals in the conversion of fallow farm fields and shell pits into a mosaic of coastal habitats. The wetlands and other habitats that result will be instrumental in "polishing" runoff from inland agricultural and industrial operations. Because projects like this require major site alterations, and because they are often near sensitive natural habitat, resource protection becomes an especially important aspect of planning and construction. The Tampa Bay Aquatic Preserves Program draws upon knowledge of site conditions and ecosystem function to help ensure that the maximum net benefit to the environment is achieved.

- The name "Cockroach Bay" may have originated with early explorers who observed numerous horseshoe crabs in the area.
- This is the only aquatic preserve in Florida in which the submerged land of the preserve is not state-owned. Hillsborough Port Authority owns the submerged lands.
- . The preserve includes two paddling trails that wind through mangrove labyrinths.
- Numerous mangrove islands provide nursery areas for snook, red drum, and other game fish.
- Submerged habitats include sea grass beds, hard bottom, and oyster reefs.
- Archaeological sites indicate the importance of this area to pre-Columbian Native Americans.

Here are directions to Cockroach Bay:

Take I-75 south; get off at Exit 46 (Sun City Center) and go west (right)until you reach U.S. 41. Turn south (Left) onto US 41 and go through Ruskin drive over the Little Manatee River Bridge and past Gulf City Road and Morgan Farm Road. Take the next road on the right, which is Cockroach Bay Road, there is a Circle K on 41 right across from the road. Go down Cockroach Bay Road to Gulf City Road and turn right. There is a wood sign at the corner that says "Cockroach Bay Aquatic Preserve." Go about one-sixth of a mile and you'll come to the gate to the preserve, on your left.

Bring your Kavaks and or canoes if you have them. we will have 10 canoes available to those that do not, the Club will provide the Lunch: desserts will not be turned awav.

We will have a Sign up sheet at the meeting we will need to register participants.

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TIPS FOR TBFFC - No. 6

Winter Fishing Strategies

We're coming into winter. Winter means extreme low tides and lower average tides. The sea grasses which were in the deeper water this summer are now exposed. Cooler water brings the fish up into these shallow grasses to warm up. Shallow water means spookier fish and an abundance of grasses to snag up your flies.

Low water means a change in your fishing strategies. First, fishing shallow means you don't need (heavily) weighted flies. Second, you need a stealthier (quiet) presentation. Third, fish are more likely feeding on crustaceans, or smaller bait fish. Forth, you need a fly which doesn't bring in more grass than fish. The obvious choice is the bendback...


The bendback is a versatile player. It can be dressed to look like a shrimp, crab, or baitfish. It can be dressed with any of your favorite materials or colors. Most patterns can be tied quickly. Its profile and build makes for quick and quiet presentations. Weight can be added with lead wire, bead chain eyes, small dumbbell eyes, or not at all. And best of all, it is inherently weedless when properly dressed.


A properly bent hook. Notice that the plain of the bend meets the back of the gape of the hook. If it is over-bent beyond the point of the hook, hooking the fish is impossible; the angle with which the hook travels doesn't allow for the hook point to dig into the fishes mouth.



It is important to bend the hook properly. The angle of the bend is much different on a long shank hook verses a short shank hook. There has to be enough room on the front portion of the bend to allow you to tie in the wing materials without crowding the hook eye. Bead chain and barbell eyes need to be tied in slightly behind the bend. Lead wire needs to be tied in along the shank behind the bend. If you are covering the shank of the hook with some type of material, extend the materials one-third of the way up the hook's gape; this will disguise the hook completely once the wing is added.

Wounded Vets Rehab With Fly Fishing By CAPT. PAT DAMICO, CapMel.com Fly Fishing Editor



Those of us that have enjoyed the many benefits fly fishing has to offer have seen our sport grow exponentially in recent years. Personal pleasure and satisfaction are a couple of the rewards as you go through the learning cycle that a journey with the long rod takes you. The difficulties that one must overcome to change our approach from one of work to one of pleasure varies with our individual abilities and the amount of time necessary to improve our skills. Adding a physical or mental disability, or both, to this learning process does not make the journey any easier.

Within the last year, I have been exposed to a benefit that I feel is the epitome of fly fishing, it is called Project Healing Waters Fly Fishing (PHWFF). Ed Nicholson, a retired navy captain, while recovering from surgery at Walter Reed Army Medical Center, met some disabled veterans and shared his longtime interest in fly fishing. Their desire to either get back to enjoy the sport or begin learning how to reap its benefits started him on a quest that several years later has become PHWFF.

Enlisting the aid of Trout Unlimited and the Federation of Fly Fishers, programs were developed to improve the physical and emotional rehabilitation of disabled active duty personnel and veterans through fly fishing and fly tying education and outings. In the fulfillment of this mission, PHWFF works with active duty personnel and veterans in military, Veterans Affairs (VA) hospitals, and Warrior Transition Units (WTU's) nationwide. Active duty, reservist, guard and veterans of all conflicts and disabilities of all types are included.

Volunteers from local fly fishing clubs meet, often weekly, with candidates who are selected by staff and after an introduction to fly fishing, show participants how to tie flies, cast a fly rod and eventually accompany them on fly fishing outings. As you can see, this is not a one shot deal, but requires continuous attention by our volunteers. Besides volunteers from fly clubs, a VA facility nearby that has acceptable candidates is needed. I have found that explaining the program to the fly clubs board of directors is a good first step. The membership is then alerted at meetings and through the club newsletter asking for volunteers. Once a network of volunteers is established, a call is made to the Chief of Volunteer Services and the Director of Recreational Therapy at the VA facility to set up a meeting with club officers. At this meeting PHWFF is explained and questions answered. Key contacts at the VA facility are necessary to set up meetings with candidates that they feel would be interested and would benefit from our program.

My experience with VA staff has been extremely positive. They are very professional and have the veteran's best interests in the forefront. The first meeting with volunteers, VA staff and veterans will introduce everyone and club members can explain the program as well as what fly tying, fly casting and fly fishing are like. We started with fly tying, then fly casting and finally had fly fishing outings where veterans could use their own flies to catch fish. There are some changes in clients as many are outpatients and may change facilities or finish treatment. In Florida, we have concentrated on panfish and bass in freshwater ponds. Saltwater flats fishing will be next.

Our first two programs in Florida have been at Baypines VA hospital in St. Petersburg with Suncoast Fly Fishers and James A. Haley VA hospital in Tampa with Tampa Bay Fly Fishing Club. Both programs are fully operational and have been a huge success. Equipment like fly tying vices and materials as well as complete fly fishing outfits are supplied by PHWFF although volunteers have donated some of the initial start up materials. Our volunteers all feel they benefit much more than the veterans.

This is an opportunity to give something to those who have given so much to you. VA doctors feel this program does a lot to improve function and strength as well as provide a wonderful escape from some of the difficulties our troups have endured for our freedom. FLY OF THE MONTH Keystone Gurgler

As tied by Ted Hagaman



Materials list

Hook: Mustad 34011 Size 6
Thread: 6/0 Uni-thread Red/Orange
Body: 2mm Dark Green Closed Cell foam
Body wrap: Medium Olive/Pearl Tinsel Chenille

Tail: Pearl Polar Flash

Instructions

- 1. Start thread 1/8 in. from eye and wrap back to point of barb
- 2. Tie in polar flash tail on top of hook above the point of the barb. Tying the tail in this far back on the hook keeps the tail from fouling. Bring thread forward to 1/8 in. behind eye.
- 3. Cut a strip of foam 3/8 in. wide and 3 in. long Place foam on top of hook with front edge of foam 1/8 in. behind and pinch it around hook. Wrap thread back over foam, binding it down and compressing it all the way back to a point just above the point of the barb. Remainder of foam will extend back along the tail at this time.
- 4. Cut a 4 in. piece of tinsel chenille and tie in above the point of the barb and wrap your thread forward to 1/8 in. behind the eye. Wrap the tinsel chenille forward around the hook shank and foam to the thread and tie off and clip off excess. At this time I trim the tinsel chenille to reduce its bulk and create a smoother surface.
- 5. Take the foam extending over the tail and fold it forward and tie it down 1/8 in. behind the eye. This will force the remaining foam to stand up and form a cup. Trim off the excess foam with an arched cut about ½ in. beyond tie in. This will form a head which will make a nice pop and bubble when worked across the surface.
- 6. Take the thread forward of the foam and build up a tapered thread head, tie off, and cement. Fly is now complete.

Fishing instructions

Fish this fly fairly aggressively on the surface, creating a surface gurgle and pop. This fly is tied in colors to match a long slender minnow found in Lake Keystone. I have taken many bass and large bream on this fly. Fish will hit this aggressively while it sits at rest between pops. This pattern tied in all white and pearl tinsel chenille is very good for snook, trout, and mackerel.



Fishing Report and Forecast "What a great time to go fishing!"

CCA had their fly fishing tournament November first and it was reported to me that Leigh West won the snook division and Capt Bryon Chamberlain won the trout division. Congratulation to both.

Capt Rick Grassett reports he had several fly anglers with him during the last several weeks, the rain and winds made it difficult to catch fish, but a few were caught on Ultra Hair Clousers.

Our own Denise Bruner and Nanette O'Hara to Oregon, no steelheads were caught but wild trout and whitefish were caught. Upon returning to Florida they went salt water fishing with Nanette's husband Rick were they caught trout, sheepshead and snook. Denise had a slam.

This past week was hard fly fishing due to the winds, but I went out to the ponds behind my house and caught some good size specks a few fair bass and bluegills.

I have no idea what December will be like, but if the wind dies down and with good tides the catching should improve. All you members have to do is get out there and catch and report to rigaulin@yahoo.com.
