July 2011 PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE


Hi Fellow Flyfishers,

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TIPS FOR TBFFC - No. 37

Casting Tip for TBFFC: 20

We described different grips while casting, but did not address how tight or loose it should be. The tendency to grip harder as more power is needed seems normal, but is detrimental. A tight grip will become tiresome and will send unnecessary shock waves thru the rod. When you practice, use only your thumb and two fingers to hold the rod as you go thru the casting stroke. You will be surprised how effective and relaxed your casting will become.

Leigh West Has Hints for Leader Construction

I make my own leaders since it is fun and economical. I still use the easy leader formula Capt. Bill Miller taught me years ago:

~section length (ft.) 4 --- 3 --- 2 --- 1 --- fly

~breaking strength (#)30 --- 20 --- 10 --- ~20 --- fly

I use inexpensive Ande monofilament line for the 4/3/2" sections.

The one foot section is the bite tippet- usually 20 to 30# fluorocarbon for inshore species. Tie-able wire can be used instead, for mackerel, barracuda, etc. I would use 30-40# fluorocarbon if big snook are around.

I usually tie the 4'>3' sections together with a blood knot, and then tie in a perfection loop in the 30# end. I coil and store a few 4'>3' sections in a ziplock bag in my pack until I need one (rarely).

I tie the 2'>1' sections at home using a triple surgeon's knot to connect the softer Ande line to the stiff fluorocarbon. I coil and store them in small ziplock bags, labeled with both the class and bite tippet breaking strengths (a half dozen/bag). I keep the bag(s) in my shirt pocket for easy access while fishing. The reasons for going to this trouble are 1) wind knots are most common (and most difficult to remove) in the thin class tippet, 2) the bite tippet will often need to be changed after catching a ladyfish or snook and 3) the surgeon's knot is difficult to tie well under adverse conditions due to the line material property differences (between nylon and fluorocarbon, e.g.) and will be more likely to fail if not tied well. Therefore, I just cut out the old 2'>1' section and tie in a new 2'>1' section whenever I need to replace either the class tippet or the bite tippet section. I tie in a fresh 2'>1' section to the 3' section using a blood knot. It is much easier to tie a 4'>3' section to a 2'>1' section than to replace the whole leader on the water since the long length of the entire leader makes it harder to handle in the wind and more likely to tangle under any condition.

This leads to...


What I carry in my fishing shirt pockets


Ziplock bag containing a few 2'>1' leader sections (see above article)- 10# Ande > 20 or 30# fluorocarbon.


Nippers with wind knot needle tool, tied to a whistle

Lens cleaners (from CVS drug store, individually wrapped. Cut the corners off the package, otherwise they poke through the shirt and are annoying)

A few flies that I know I will most likely use, in a small plastic ziplock bag, and Lip balm with UVP > 15

A CALL FOR ORAL HISTORIES OF FLY FISHING

Before some of our most memorable moments are lost, let's contribute to this program! If you have an input or suggestion for this program, please inform Dick Miekka as well as Jessica Bailey.

My name is Jessica Bailey and I am the Project Manager for Voices from the Fisheries. While doing on line research, I found the Tampa Bay Fly Fishing Club website. I am writing today to introduce our project to you and to inquire if you know of any oral history projects related to recreational fishing in your area.

To begin, the Voices from the Fisheries Project (http://voices.nmfs.noaa.gov/index.html) provides a central repository for oral history interviews from around the country which document the knowledge, cultures, perspectives, values, histories. experiences of people engaged in commercial, recreational, and subsistence fishing and related activities in our Nation's marine waters and the Great Lakes, and those of our territories. Project partners include the Working Waterfront Festival, MIT Sea Grant, Rutgers University, Long Island Traditions, and Commercial Fishermen of America. The project is funded through a combination of NOAA's Fishery Service and NOAA Preserve America Initiative funds.

The purpose of this project is to consolidate existing collections and encourage the creation of new oral histories from around the country. Oral histories are a powerful way to document the human experience. When archived separately, the ability of these interviews to be viewed as part of a collective history is compromised. Donating a copy of interviews to the database ensures the accessibility and availability of these collections to residents of coastal communities, researchers, students, and the general public for years to come.

In addition, the repository provides collection holders with an additional site to archive their important work. Many collection holders do not have the resources to provide public access to their collections if they choose to do so. Voices from the Fisheries allows these collections to be made available. There are many ways in which a collection owner can

participate in the VFF Project. Please take a few minutes to look at our web site; it provides more information about the project.

If you know of any oral history projects from your region, I would welcome any leads. Please feel free to forward this information on to anyone you believe may be interested in the project. I look forward to your reply.

Beach Snook Fishing

There are a few snook around on Casey Key this time of



year. If you've never caught a snook on fly or sight fished, this is a great spot to go.

From Tampa, just hop on I-75,

drive south and get off on the Venice/Nokomis exit. Head south on US41 to Albee Rd W (follow the sign for Casey Key), drive west and park just over the bridge at Nokomis Beach. (Note: If not going to Casey Key, just pick a Florida gulf coast beach, from Sanibel/Captiva Islands all the way up to Honeymoon Island- the same techniques below will apply...).

Pick a summer day with a clear sky and a light easterly morning breeze. These conditions are the norm in the summer. There is no need to get there earlier than 8 a.m. because you won't be able to see fish in the lower light conditions. Don't bother going after 1-2 p.m. as the sea breeze and clouds will often make fishing impossible.

Walk north along Casey Key/Nokomis Beach (I usually do 1-2 miles one way, but much longer/shorter trips are possible) and look for the fish right along the shore. Cast a small Clouser minnow or needlefish pattern (size 4 hook) on a ~7 weight rod lined with either a floating or clear sink tip fly line. Use the latter if there is any surf. A stripping basket helps. Watch your back cast and avoid fishing in areas with any swimmers or beachcombers around. Use 20-30 pound test fluorocarbon bite tippet. Most of the fish will be small. Bring some forceps as the fish have deep mouths.

Don't expect a banner day every time- a good day might be 2-4 fish. It's not about numbers for this type of fishing but the fish are fun and it's a great way to improve one's fishing skills in advance of a bonefish trip, for example.

Be sure to wear a hat, polarized glasses and comfortable shoes with good support- It's tough walking in loose sand. Wear light, cool, comfortable clothing and protect yourself from the sun. Be sure to drink PLENTY of water during your drive down and just before your start, and bring a bottle of something in your pack (trust me-you will need it). There is a water fountain at the parking area, shower/foot wash and bathroom, but there are absolutely no facilities and nowhere to get water up north on the

beach, and nowhere to get off the beach without trespassing.


Flying Fish Outfitters, located on Albee Rd just east of Nokomis Beach, carries a nice selection of beach snook flies, plus they can provide you with current fishing reports and conditions.

FLY OF THE MONTH

#6 JJ Popper







Materials

Hook: #6 hump back hook

Tail: Combination of fine flash, crystal chenille, and small

feathers (see text and photo)

Body: #6 popper body, Testor's paint

Eyes: Stick-on or painted eyes

Legs: medium rubber centipede legs in chartreuse/black

Thread: flat waxed nylon Glue: Fletching cement

Tying Instructions

- 1. A hook and body popper kit (for 10 flies) can be found at the Bass Pro Shop. Glue the body to the hook with fletching glue.
- 2. When dry, use a very small drill bit to make two holes on each side that criss-cross. Make sure the holes are high enough to clear the hump in the hook. I use a tool that looks like an Exacto knife, to hold the drill bit.
- Paint the body. I use black, green, or yellow with black
- Attach stick-on eyes or paint them using Testors paint from A.O.E. or Wal-Mart. Use a small drill bit end for dots and pupils, and a larger one for the white around the eye.
- Attach and wrap thread, stopping at the hook bend.
- 6. Tye on a $\frac{3}{4}$ " long tail of thin flash.
- 7. Apply glue on remaining thread. Wrap chenille or palmer a hackle on the remaining shank.
- 8. Tye on two 2 inch long diagonal feathers, for wings. Palmer one more hackle, just behind popper head.
- 9. Whip finish.
- 10. Use bobbin threader to pull medium centipede legs through. This size can handle 4 legs on each side.

When fishing this popper, retrieves vary at different times. I start with a big push of water to make a circle, slight pause, and then continue right up to the rod end. Any questions just ask at next meeting
