

Tips for TBFFC

I like to use a fairly vertical and short casting stroke for most of my fishing. I pick up the line normally and stop my back cast at 2 PM on the clock. As the line straightens behind me, I bring my line (left) hand to the reel and let my reel hand drift back a little. I start the forward cast by leading with the reel and moving my casting hand/arm forward on the "shelf" keeping a firm wrist. This motion will load the rod and keep a tight loop since your rod tip is moving in a straight line. Finish with a short haul and by finally letting your wrist push forward. Be sure to stop your rod at 10 AM on the clock, aiming high to send the line out above your target. Your fly will settle to the water nicely. This efficient motion will cast the line 40-60 feet using the power of the rod. //Walt

RANDOM THOUGHTS FROM THE TYING BENCH

MULLET – If you want to try catching mullet on a fly, just use a small green fly. Nothing fancy, just a simple dubbed nymph pattern on a #10 freshwater hook. Tie them in several hues of green. Capt. Gene Zamba says, "If the mullet are spooky, as they are most of the time, try chumming with breadcrumbs or small bits of white bread." He claims you cannot tell the difference between a 4 pound mullet and a 4 pound bonefish in the Keys. If game fish are not around, try for some of these "English Bonefish."



Fly of the Month


I started fishing this small crab/shrimp fly in December. On four trips the first week I caught 13 fish: 4 reds, 4 trout, 4 snook and 1 sheepshead. I really tied it with sheepshead in mind and that was the first fish I caught as it tailed first thing in the morning,

Hook: Gamakatsu B10S Stinger, size 6 or Mustad Tarpon 2XH/2XS, size 4. Use bead chain eyes on the stinger hook for a light fly and small lead eyes on the Mustad hook for a little heavier fly.

I have been tying mostly with clear mono thread. On the light hook, tie in the bead chain and add a little lead wire behind and over the eyes. Next, tie in a bit of orange rabbit for a small tail to represent an egg sack. Next cut two small pieces of thin zonkers and tie one on each side of the tail in the back. Use crystal flash to complete the body. I also add one strand of hard Mason (20 lb) for a weed guard. Tie the fly in tan or brown to fish over sand and black or green to fish over grass. You can also use Puglici tarantula for the body. However, the Crystal flash works fine and is a little brighter. I'll tie a few of these at the next meeting. This simple fly is a winner as it hops along the bottom with lively legs.

Casting Clinic December 16, 2017. This year the casting clinic was hosted by the Suncoast Fly Fishers (SFF)) at Egan Park in St. Pete Beach. The casting clinics was initiated by Pat Damico in 2006 and Dayle Mazzarella setup the program and course for the last 5 years. Several excellent instructors included Dayle Mazzarella, Pat Damico, Leigh West, Steve Parker, Chris O'Byrne, Ken Zadoyko, Louis Bruno, and Tom Gadacz. The casting clinic is primarily staffed by FFI Certified Master Casting Instructors and Certified Casting Instructors. The casting clinics are free to all FFI members and \$35 for others which includes a FFI membership. We had 23 attendees, including 3 new members. Members from the SFF, TBFFC, and the Mangrove Coast Fly Fishers attended the clinic. It was a great session and provided FFI members an opportunity to improve their casting skills as a benefit of their FFI membership. Tom Gadacz

Fishing Report and Forecast "What a great time to go fishing!"

Capt Pat Damico provides this report from his Captain's Corner: Good time for shallow water flats fishing:


Shallow-water flats fishing can be very exciting this time of year. Trout and redfish are available in good numbers, and the opportunities to catch some gator trout have made recent trips very rewarding. Some of the largest trout have been in very skinny water, which allows them to be sight fished. Cold, early morning water temperatures will climb as the sun in protected shallow areas creates a warm, friendly environment for southern fish. As the tide comes in, large trout will appear frequently residing in sand holes, lighter appearing openings in the grass, where they await unsuspecting baitfish. Water in sand holes is a little deeper than the adjacent grassy area, offering them a better sense of security. Prop scars are often used by large fish to more easily enter the shallows undetected. We have found that artificial lures and flies must be worked slowly on the bottom to be effective. Several casts to sand holes revealed large fish that blew out as our boat approached their lair. Approaching carefully on foot and making long casts that are accurate will increase chances for success. Fly designs that have the hook pointed upward in chartreuse and white as well as chartreuse and pink produced most hookups, especially in clear water. Discolored water often favors brown over orange or black over purple. Large sheepshead will be there and prefer small flies that replicate sand fleas, one of their favorite foods. Pat Damico charters lower Tampa Bay and can be reached at captpatdamico.com or (727) 504-8649.

Capt Rick Grassett suggests with the water temperature in the low 70's, action with Spanish mackerel, albies, tripletail and cobia in the coastal gulf should continue. There should also be good action with trout and more on deep grass flats of Sarasota Bay. Shallow water action for snook, trout and reds is improving due to cooler water. Fishing lighted docks and bridges in the ICW for snook with flies and DOA Lures should also be a good option.

Kayak guide, Neil Taylor, reports generally we have good action, but we have not yet hit the peak of the wintertime bite. Big trout became easier to catch the past two weeks. Redfish action is good if you are in the exact right spots. Bluefish for sure have been a big story. Seven pound bluefish on fly is something you are unlikely to ever forget. Pompano action is probably over until spring but don't be surprised if they are accidental catches this time of year.

The Cypress Park flat continues to hold schools of redfish. They hang on the outside bar on the lowest tides and come up on the flat as the tide comes in. New and full moon tides are best with the lowest lows and good moving water. Fish small shrimp or crab flies on long leaders down to 12 lb and cast will ahead of spooky fish. The MacDII flat is also fishing well with reds, sheepshead and black drum. Fish the lowest negative tides during the New Year.




