Tips for TBFFC

For sight fishing in the winter use longer and lighter leaders to cast small shrimp, crab and minnow patterns. A popular formula according to Chico Fernandez in his new book *Fly Fishing for Redfish* is 50%/30%/20%. Thus, for a light winter leader, I will use six feet of 30, four feet of 20 and three feet of 12 pound test. This gives a 13 foot leader that will turn over small flies just fine and should be stealthy enough. I also like to fish a clear tip line in the winter as an extra precaution. Winter fish in our clear bay waters will be extra cautious and will spook when they see your line or leader. Make careful casts with long leaders and light flies for your best chance to catch a big redfish in skinny water.

RANDOM THOUGHTS FROM THE TYING BENCH By C.W. "Don" Coleman

Maxims: "Fly fishing in the surf is practiced in the current created by the breaking waves, not the tide. Fish as nearly parallel to the waves as possible and allow the fly to be carried into the wash." – Ken Abrames

The art of fly tying is in your choice of materials and tying methods so that your fly will appear alive, whether at rest or being retrieved.

Flies that do not have that essential spark of life are usually effective only with a strip retrieve, which is seldom productive when fish are feeding on the "drift".

Learn to take pride in your fly casting and your fly tying. If you can't, practice until you can.

PAT DAMICO'S BACKWATER MUDDLER

Materials

Hook - Mustad Signature C70S D Tail - White marabou Legs - Yellow Sili-legs Body - EP shrimp dub brush (tan) Eyes - Bead chain or lead Thread - Flat waxed nylon



Tying Instructions

Tie one marabou feather at the rear of the hook, creating $1 \frac{1}{2} - 2$ inch tail.

Tie one leg on either side of the tail ahead of the tail.

Tie in eyes about 1/8 inch back from the hook eye.

Palmer the shrimp dub brush from the front of the area where the tail is tied in to behind the eyes.

Use a brush to comb it toward the tail. Add a weed guard as needed.

Use for snook and baby tarpon.

Robert Fischer's Great Day: Last January I set up a trip with fly fishing guide Greg Peterson (601-4605). After our 48 hour winter season this year the weather turned perfect. It was one of those days I've seen on TV but never happens whenever I go fishing. The wind was dead calm, temperatures from 55 to 75, no clouds and good incoming tides. The full moon was a problem; I avoid fishing during the full moon, but Greg said it would probably be all right. We left the boat ramp in Greg's Maverick Mirage and flew across the bay. It was like running in melted butter, velvety smooth and dry with the 4 stroke Yamaha quietly purring along.



Our first stop was barren so we moved to another flat about 5 miles away. The sun rose a little and the visibility started to improve. Now if you've fished Tampa Bay redfish you know how spooky they can be, worse than any Bahamas bonefish. And if you've fished on dead calm waters you know how much worse that can make it. But I was using a 7 weight rod with a 12' leader and a Puglisi pancake fly that landed without any splash at all so I knew we had a chance. We began seeing fish and after a few well placed casts we got several refusals. Greg suggested a different colored fly that would sink faster. A nice fish showed up at about 60' and my lucky, long cast landed perfectly. Two strips and the fish pounced on the fly. The fight was on. The 7 weight bent into the cork and into the backing she went. Big smiles all around as the big fat red girl ran and wallowed in the mirrored water. After 10 minutes, she came to hand, we took some photos, retrieved the fly from deep in her crushers and revived her a bit before sending her on her way. 32 to 34 inches of golden beauty. Wow that was perfect textbook red-fishing, the way it should be.

Robert Fischer's Great Day continued:

Moving to another flat we had several shots but some were that impossible 10' to 15' cast when the fish would appear out of nowhere and any movement would spook them. That's great for your adrenalin rush but not good for hooking up. Getting a little shallower revealed some tailing fish that allowed us to get set up and ready before getting too close. One fish, 50' away let me make 5 casts but all were to far away from the spot he was grubbing in. After getting in to 30', a cast landed 2' away and the fight was on again. Lots of line had to be cleared as this fish took off like a scalded dog and got well into the backing also. Another good bulldog like fight and we had our second redfish over 30". Holy cow, this never happens to me but I'm sure glad it did today.

A short lunch break and on to the next flat. A high sun with no clouds or wind made the visibility spectacular. We saw lots of fish and got several good and some not so good shots; tough redfishing for sure. A little deeper water (maybe 20") and Greg suggested a different shrimpy, crabby pattern he ties that would hug the bottom. The next shot was a long one, about 70'. Two fish coming right at us, but a good cast and Greg's coaching on when to strip led to our 3rd hookup in classic fashion. Of course, the smaller of the two fish got the fly but still she went into the backing. Another good long stubborn fight. This beauty was only 28".


We got a few more shots but were snubbed. No matter, with three fish caught and a total of over 90" on a perfect winter day, I had no complaints. I've done a lot of fly fishing for reds and this was my best day ever. Greg is a great captain and very enjoyable to fish with. He has a beautiful high performance boat and he has flies that work. Fishing Report and Forecast "What a great time to go fishing!"

Capt Pat Damico provides this report from his Captain's Corner: Water temperatures in the 70s were a pleasant surprise during recent fly fishing river trips. Redfish, ladyfish, trout, snook, largemouth bass and a few baby tarpon were our reward for slow, deep presentations of baitfish patterns. Deep water with wood structure harbored the most quality fish. Arriving at the end of the outgoing tide allowed us to see trees and wood that would later be covered with a fast incoming tide. Full sinking fly lines matched with an 8 weight fly rod were used with a short 4-foot, 20-pound leader and a 30-pound hard monofilament shock tippet. Weighted synthetic baitfish patterns with a 30-pound hard monofilament weed or wood guard in sizes 1 and 2 can probe depths and not hang up.

Capt Rick Grassett reports fish in shallow water have been very spooky due to clear water and calm conditions making them tough to catch, although you should find snook, larger trout and reds there when conditions are good. Wading with a fly rod or making long casts with spinning tackle are good tactics for fishing shallow water. Catch and release night snook fishing around lighted docks and bridges in the ICW with flies and DOA Lures should also be a good option. Trout, blues, Spanish mackerel, pompano and more should be good options on deep grass flats of Sarasota Bay.

Kayak guide Neil Taylor reports action has been fantastic in a year where we really have not had a winter. Trout are big and in good numbers. Redfish are cooperative most of the time. It is a great time of year to get on great action. The afternoons have been better than the mornings generally. That trend should reverse as spring arrives.

Fishing at MacDill AFB remains fairly slow this winter with a lack of redfish. Some trout, sheepshead and a few snook are around, but the reds and black drum are largely absent. I don't know why as MacDill is usually very good in the winter. The Cypress flat continues to hold fish on the low tide inside the bar over the grass. The fish are very spooky and require long (12-14 ft) leaders and small flies. Cast to tailing fish when their tails are in the air when possible.
