

White Elephant Exchange

Players draw names to determine what order they will go in

The first player selects a gift from the pool and opens it

Make sure everyone can see the gift!

The following players can choose to either pick an unwrapped gift from the pool or steal a previous player's gift. Anyone who gets their gift stolen in this way can do the same – choose a new gift or steal from someone else.

- To keep things moving along, there are a couple of limits on gift swapping:
- A present can only be stolen once per turn, which means players who have a gift stolen from them have to wait to get it back.
- After three swaps, the turn automatically comes to an end (otherwise things could drag on for a long time).

Three Swaps and the Gift is Out. If a present gets stolen three times, it's out of the game and the person who holds it gets to walk away with it.

After all players have had a turn, the first player gets a chance to swap the gift he or she is holding for any other opened gift. Anyone who's gift is stolen may steal from someone else (as long as that person hasn't been stolen from yet). When someone declines to steal a gift, the game comes to an end.

Note that for this last "extra" turn, the three-swap rule doesn't apply. Players can keep swapping until someone decides to stand pat, or there are no other eligible people to steal from.

The BIG GUN SHOOT-OUT



Fly Casting Clinic, Saturday, Dec. 16, 2017

Location: Egan Field @ 9101 Blind Pass Road in St. Pete Beach, FL 33706.

This session is also open to the public but they must register with St. Pete Beach Community Center in person at 7701 Boca Ciega Drive, St. Pete Beach, FL 33706 or by calling 727-363-9245. It is free for all Fly Fishers International members. Non-FFI members \$35, which includes membership to FFI. St Pete Beach community members are free but they must sign up with the recreation center. We will then contact them to become FFI Members.

Suncoast Fly Fishers will host a Fly Casting Clinic, taking turns with Tampa Bay Fly Fishing Club with two Master Casting Instructors (MCI) – Dayle Mazzarella and Pat Damico -- who will be assisted by other well known instructors and casters in the Tampa Bay area, Leigh West and Steve Parker. Additional IFFF Instructors will be available.

Registration is at 8:00 am. The course starts PROMPTLY at 8:30 am and continues until approximately 3 pm.

We will have some equipment for those who need it, so pre-registration is very helpful. A 5-wt. to 8- wt. rod with a 7-8 ft. leader is recommended. Bringing your own is recommended so the instructors can check to see if it is balanced. We will have leader material, yarn fly, name tags, etc. We will familiarize participants with the format, layout, schedule, etc.

Schedule: 8 am – Check in, coffee and donuts

8:30 am – Basic casting principles and execution. This portion is designed to help beginners learn to make basic casts and understand the principles involved. In addition, more experienced casters will learn how to teach friends and family. A handout of the principles and drills will be provided. Even experienced casters will find this portion helpful in reviewing the basics which, in turn, will help prepare for the more advanced casts later in the day.

DRILLS: Grass Drill, Pick-Up and Lay-Down, False Casting, Feeding Line, Roll Cast, Roll Cast to Pick Up and Feed. Each drill will have an advanced challenge for those pushing their limits.

Tips for TBFFC

Capt. Pat Damico. Can't get a straight layout of line while fly fishing?

When I recently met two candidates for a follow up casting lesson, they wanted me to do it on their flats boat to simulate fishing conditions. They had two high end balanced outfits and the first rod they were casting would not allow them to get a straight line layout from fly to rod tip. There was some wind. I first shortened their 12 foot leader to about 7 feet getting rid of about 5 feet of the very light tippet end. The 1/0 bulky deer hair body fly was light when dry, but when wet and water logged was like casting a miniature feather duster. I put on a smaller synthetic fly. Those two changes allowed them to get a nice layout of line without any other adjustments.

Random Thoughts from the Tying Bench By C.W. "Don" Coleman

The art of fly tying is in your choice of materials and tying methods so that your fllies will appear alive, whether at rest or being retrieved.

Flies that do not have that essential spark of life are usually effective only with a strip retrieve, which is seldom productive when fish are feeding on the "drift".

Learn to take pride in your fly casting and your fly tying. If you can't, practice until you can.

Wooly Bugger by Denise Bruner

Materials

Body - cactus chenille medium pearl and one webby feather Hook - Gamakatsu SP11-3L3H #4

Eyes - Lead XS

Tail - Root beer marabou



Tying Sequence

Lay a base wrap on the whole length of the hook to the beginning of the hook bend and advance the thread to about 1/8th behind the hook eye and tie in the eyes on top of the hook. Go back to the hook and tie a bunch of marabou as a tail about one hook length long. Tie in the base of the feather in front of the tail then the chenille. Palmer the chenille around

the hook, up to the eyes, where it is tied off.

Palmer the feather around the body up to the hook eye and tie it off. Whip finish and use head cement to finish the wraps at the head.



Place apples In a large bowl and toss in 1/2 cup sugar and 1 Tbsp of cinnamon

Unroll a Pillsbury pie crust in a 9" pie pan and fill with prepared apples


Unroll 2nd pie crust and place over apples and crimp two crusts together around the perimeter of the pan


Pierce the top crust 5-6 times with a fork

Pew Trust Seeks to Protect Forage Fish

As you know, a major part of Pew's work is aimed at protecting forage fish. These small, schooling "baitfish," such as sardines and mullet, are food for tarpon, redfish, bottlenose dolphins, grouper, and other coastal fish and wildlife. In this way, forage fish help make Florida the "Fishing Capital of the World" and a global destination for scuba diving, birding, and fresh seafood. But, for all their importance and vulnerability, we know relatively little about Florida's forage fishes.

In order to help address this scientific shortfall, the International Game Fish Association – Pew's partner in forage fish conservation and leader of the Florida Forage Fish Coalition – kicked off a "School Up for Forage Fish" crowdfunding campaign. The campaign seeks to raise \$15,000 to fully fund a new Florida Forage Fish Research Program fellowship in 2018. The year-long, student-led fellowship will help the state's fish and wildlife managers answer some of the most pressing questions regarding forage and their relationship to predators.

Directions to the Hatchery

FWC Stock Enhancement Research Facility (Fish and Wildlife Depart – to Map Quest)

14495 Harlee Road, Palmetto, Florida 34221 (941) 723-4505

Located at Port Manatee on Highway 41 – 7-miles north of Palmetto, FL

From St. Petersburg, FL, Take I-275 South across the Skyway Bridge and stay in the left two lanes of I-275; once you're about 0.25-mile beyond the toll booth on the south side of the bridge (Manatee County). Stay on I-275 until you see Exit 1 Port Manatee- 2-3 miles from the bridge. Get off on Exit 1, go down the ramp, turn north on to Highway 41 (you'll go under the overpass of I-275).

Proceed north on Highway 41 for about 4-miles and be looking for the white water tower on the left side of the road. Turn left on to Piney Point Road, which is the north entrance for Port Manatee. You will cross over two sets of RR tracks. Turn right after the second set onto Harlee Road. Look for green sign with FWC logo. The hatchery is ~ 0.8-mile from the Piney Point/Harlee Road intersection.

Proceed east on Harllee Road for about a 0.25-mile and than the road will curve to the north. The facility is on the left (west) side of the road. Look for the lime-green colored billboard near the road. There's a prison on the right side of Harlee. Pull up the main office (gray) trailer and let the front office know you'll be harvesting Spartina.



Fishing Report and Forecast "What a great time to go fishing!"

Capt. Pat Damico provides this report from his Captain's Corner. Fly Fishing Success Possible, Even In Wind

When your day to fly fish arrives, do you hope for a day without wind? Knowledgeable fly fishers know there are many ways to deal with different wind situations. Avoid open water, and select an area that offers protection. Stay close to shore and use many of our bays, the high banks as we see on some rivers, trees, mangrove shorelines, buildings and canal systems. Check wind conditions the day before and plan your trip on paper. Morning easterly winds are frequently followed by winds from the west. A large narrow bay that runs north to south often provides protected fishing all day. Begin on the eastern side in the morning and fish the west side in the afternoon. Explore docks and canals, concentrating on points where tidal flow is optimum. Know where there are grass flats with sand holes and dropoffs. A bow-mounted electric motor controls speed and direction. Employ your preferred anchoring system carefully when a concentration of fish is found. Use a fast action rod, a 71/2-foot or shorter leader with a 20-pound tippet. Downsize flies and reduce their weight to make casting and turnover easier. A chop on the water will allow you to get closer to the fish. If the wind has affected water clarity, use darker flies. Baitfish patterns size 2-4 are best. Pat Damico charters lower Tampa Bay and can be reached at captpat.com and (727) 504-8649.

Capt. Rick Grassett reports with the water temperature in the low 70's, action with Spanish mackerel, albies, tripletail and cobia in the coastal gulf should continue. There should also be good action with trout and more on deep grass flats of Sarasota Bay. Shallow water action for snook, trout and reds is improving due to cooler water. Fishing lighted docks and bridges in the ICW for snook with flies and DOA Lures should also be a good option.

Kayak guide Neil Taylor reports full fall action is finally here. Water temperatures finally dropped. The feeding accelerated. With the arrival of fall we have new opportunities. Bluefish have become a primary target. Large trout are becoming easier to catch. Redfish opportunities are better. These are great months we have ahead.

Club member Denise Bruner: I went fishing with **Chris Hargiss** November 25 on the east side of Tampa Bay and had a half dozen fish; Snook, Redfish, Sheepshead and even a 30 LB Cobia follow my fly but did not connect! Maybe next time! It was a great day on the water just the same, I have visions of redfish instead of sugarplums now.

Jack Hexter reports mackerel are thick in 8-10' of water just North of Anclote. Took a friend out today and caught a bunch, about 10 on the fly and a lot more on the spinners. Biggest was 20" If you want some fun and constant action, anchor up and hang a chum bag. If you chum, they will come

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
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
