

Tips for TBFFC: No. 79

Why don't I get a good straight layout of my fly line when making my presentation cast? There are many reasons. A frequent one is to not have a proper stop at the end of both forward and back casts. When the length of fly line is the same, the forward and back cast should be identical in all respects, unless wind is a factor. Watching an experienced fly caster present a cast should look smooth. The forward stop is almost unperceivable, but must be there. Using the mantra, "Stop, Stop, and Drop," can be helpful. Lefty refers to this as a," Speed up and stop!" **Pat Damico, MCI**

RANDOM THOUGHTS FROM THE TYING BENCH

HACKLE FLIES – The basic Hackle Fly, which was popularized as the Sea Ducer by Chico Fernandez, was developed in the late 1880s. In its basic version it consists of a splayed saddle hackle tail tied in at the bend of the hook with saddle hackles wound up the shank of the hook. Today, mylar flash is usually added to the tail. In the early days of saltwater fly fishing the fly was used to imitate shrimp. What ever it is supposed to imitate, it is widely used today in both fresh and salt water fly fishing. It is usually tied on either standard length or long shank hooks in sizes ranging from #2 to #1/0. Lefty Kreh writes about the Red and White Hackle Fly, "This is one of the best patterns for both large and smallmouth bass that I've fished in more than 50 years I've been chasing them." Lefty favors an all white tail and with red wound hackles. It is also one of the top five flies Lefty recommends for inshore saltwater fly fishing. Hackle flies are simple, highly productive flies that land softly and, if tied full, can nearly suspend in the water column.





Fishing Report and Forecast "What a great time to go fishing!"

Capt Pat Damico provide this report from his Captain's Corner: Captains are displaying pictures of big gator trout this time of year. Most are caught with bait, a few with artificials. Find baitfish on drop-offs or in a deep hole surrounded by shallow water, and a school of small trout will be easy to locate. Large yellow mouth trout usually are in shallow water and occasionally with a few similar-sized friends. Find warmer shallow water containing baitfish. Many of these locations are impossible to access with a conventional boat. A canoe or a kayak is one of the best ways to cover large deeper areas on your way to the shallows. Tethered it around your waist with a line while walking in ankle-deep water. Use maps and charts to find the trout. Even large trout can be hard to see. Move slowly and look for fleeing baitfish, nervous water and fish shadows on the bottom. You will spook some fish, but remember where the lunkers were to develop a pattern for finding more. //Pat

Capt Bryon Chamberlin reports lots of good sized redfish and large trout in the Homosassa area on the negative low tides. Just watch where you run the boat or you may be missing a lower unit.

Capt Steve Parker reported good trout and lady fish action in Cockroach Bay in January.

I fished the day after our last meeting in a 15 to 20 mph North wind where the MacDill flat was dry for a ½ mile out with a super negative low. Multiple reds, drum and sheepshead were roaming the edge of the flat and I sight-fished 15 reds and one drum in a couple of hours on crab and shrimp flies. The Cypress Park flat also fished well on the low tides in January and Rick and Logan Valarie sight-fished 5 nice reds on the MLK weekend. The Cypress flat offers excellent fishing on a good low incoming tide during the winter and is easy to fish with a firm sand bottom. Most folks fish North of the beach, but I had a reliable report of tailing reds South of the Cypress Beach. //Walt









