Thanks to our speakers of last month, **Dr Aaron Adams** and **Kathy Guindon**, who educated us on the life cycle of the tarpon.



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RANDOM THOUGHTS FROM THE TYING BENCH -- 31 By C.W. "Don" Coleman

FLY ROD GRIPS – Too little attention is paid to the cork grips on fly rods. They are designed to fit the largest hands. I guess oversized guides and undersized grips are not ascetically pleasing. I believe that if you hold a fly rod with the thumb-on-top grip, you should be able to just touch your second and third finger to the pad at the base of the thumb in order to have complete control of the fly rod. This is also where the fulcrum point of the rod with a loaded reel should be, which usually requires a heavier reel than one sized for the line weight in order to have a well balanced outfit. With a balanced rod and reel, and a grip sized for *your* hand you will not need to maintain a tight grip throughout the casting strokes. A firm grip will only be needed during the speed-up-and-stop. You will never find a professional golfer swinging clubs that are not tailored for his hand.

Rods grips come in a variety of styles. I prefer the old Fenwick or Half Wells style grip instead of the Full Wells grip usually installed on heavy fly rods. I do not like inletted reel seats which require the full wells grip that are usually installed in top-of-the-line rods. But then I like fishing tools instead of the latest commercial fad. Reversed Half Well grips, Reversed Half Well with Fine Point, and Cigar style grips do not allow full control of the rod with the thumb. I do like a rounded, 1 ½ inch long cork fighting butt, But not the removable type.

I like an up-locking reel seat, but not an expensive one. The simple, inexpensive Fuji size 16 reel seat is just all right with me. And please leave off the damn hook keeper. You can see why I prefer building my own rod. And while we are at it, just plain rod wraps using NCP thread and without trim wraps makes the most sense to me on a rod used for fishing instead of show.


Feel free to disagree with any of the above.

DON'S SIMPLE BUCKTAIL – Take a #1 Eagle Claw 245 SS (stainless) hook, inspect the hook, and bend down the barb. Then form a Conservation Bend. Tie on a sparse bunch of red bucktail immediately behind the hook eye using Red Fly Master Plus thread and allow it to extend beyond the bend. Tie in white bucktail to surround the bottom 2/3rd of the hook shank and veil the red bucktail. Then tie in a bunch of white bucktail for a top wing surrounding the top 1/3rd of the hook shank. The total length of the fly should be twice the length of the hook. Whip finish and cement, or use three, four wrap whip finishes with waxed thread. Use when very small bait is present, as a dropper, or even as a trailer behind a Johnson Sprite spoon...if you want to resort to "hardware."

BUCKTAIL – Look for the smaller, less expensive bucktail with short, fine hairs. Avoid the largest, "saltwater" bucktails. You will be throwing away more than half of any bucktail you buy to get rid of the courser hairs that flare too much. The bottom half of most bucktails are not really tail hairs, they are from the hide ahead and around the tail. Be sure to comb out the part you are keeping and wash in Woolite. Then rinse in clear, cold water and lay the tail out straight and let dry. Your flies will show the care you take in preparing the bucktail.

MAXIMS:

- "If you are working at fly casting you are not doing it right." -- Lefty Kreh
- The rod tip is for casting. The butt is for fighting fish.
- There are always fish here...sometimes.
- Be careful out there. A lot of wading fly fishers drown each year



Just a suggestion from one who taught Fly Tying for 52 years, tied professionally for 30 years and learned the trade under George Harvey at Penn State in 1949.

I have no regrets. My life has been the envy of many people and I have done just about everything I ever wanted to do. I accept the fact that as I approach 82 years of age in June there are things I will not be able to do any more. I will now be relegated to fishing with Arlene's "Hot Pink Balloon" method. It really works and I look forward to it.

She has outfished me on the Green River for the last 3 years and never taken less than 30 fish a day. I become the student and she the teacher.

My thanks to all of you for allowing me to be a part of the Tampa Bay Fly Fishing Club. I have many memories to treasure because of it and perhaps I have contributed a little to a few peoples lives.

FLY OF THE MONTH

Neerly Live Bait Fly
Originated and tied by Dan Sauvageau



The Dan's Neerly Live Bait fly is one of the most popular and productive flies I ever tied. This fly has even out-fished live whitebaits on a charter captain's boat. It can be tied in any color and colored with markers to imitate any type of baitfish. This fly has caught too many species to list. It is even great on L.M. Bass. You can get these flies or the materials to make them on Dan's Custom Flys web site. http://www.ij.net/danscustomflys/

Materials List

Hook – Size 2 to 2/0 Eagle Claw 254ss, L067S or Gamakatsu SC15

Thread - Clear mono Thread

Tail – Krystal Flash pearl or UV Pearl

Wing – Neer Hair Polar bear with olive, blue, chart topping

Flash – Angel Hair

Eyes – 3D Prism Eyes

Adhesives - Super Glue and Goop

Top Color - Chartpak Waterproof marker.

Tying instructions

Step 1 – Tie on about 12 strands of Krystal Flash doubled over at the rear of the hook just before the bend.

Step 2 – Tie on a clump of white or smoke Neer Hair over the Krystal Flash, and then double it under. Put a drop of super glue on that tie in spot.

Step 3 – Wrap the thread about 3/16 of an inch forward and repeat step 2. Tie on some Angel Hair to the sides of the fly for flash.

Step 4 – Wrap the thread about 3/16 of an inch forward again this time put the darker color like olive on the top of 3. the hook like a high tie.

Step 5 - At the same point as step 4 tie on the white to the bottom side of the hook in a high tie style.

Step 6 – Repeat step 4 and 5 at the eye of the hook and 6. finish off the head.

Step 7 – Trim the fly to a high profile minnow shape. Stick on the 3D Prism Eyes with goop or epoxy.

Casting Tips for TBFFC: 88

Line Speed and Accuracy ©2007

While practicing accuracy fly casting recently on a calm day, I discovered a marked improvement in reliability when I imparted just sufficient line speed to cause the leader to straighten without recoiling. Casting to a target some 50 feet distant, I experimented first with maintaining the same rod position at the end of the cast. This consistent end of cast rod position ensured that the 50 feet of line and leader past the rod tip always straightened to the 50-foot mark. Assured that I had that part of the cast consistent, I was puzzled why some casts landed short and often off-target from right to left. The culprit was excessive line speed. Many of my casts had sufficient line speed to carry the fly an additional ten feet past the target. This created two problems: 1.) the line recoiled back at the end of the cast, and 2.) when casting righthanded, the leader curved slightly to the left at the end of the cast.

The solution arose from adjusting line speed such that the leader barely straightened completely at the end of the cast. Doing so minimized line recoil and the tendency for the leader to curve left at the end of the cast. The process required just a few casts to sense the balance between inadequate and excessive line speed. My hit-rate improved so dramatically, I admonished myself for not having paid closer attention sooner to the interplay between line speed and accuracy.

The couple saw several other reds and a lot of mullet.

Fly anglers caught and released trout and ladyfish with Ultra Hair Clouser flies on a couple of trips in Sarasota Bay during the first week of April. Capt. Rick Grassett, Perry Greene, and his son, Dirk, both from MI, had a good trip with lots of trout and ladyfish caught and released with flies and CAL jigs with shad tails on Tuesday, April 10th. Other family members fished Capt. Kelly Stilwell and had similar action.

Capt. Wade Osborne has found success fishing for Cobia in Tampa Bay recently. The Simmons Park and Coffee Pot Bayou areas have been the most productive spots. Wade recommends a long black streamer, a 10 weight rod and an intermediate sinking line. The fish have been following the larger stingrays. If you're in the mood for a little faster action, try mackerel around the markers. These fish will take most minnow imitators fishing fast.
